## **Community Engagement** and Public Affairs

The Investigations budget includes **\$2,452,000** for the School Resource Officer Program at FUSD high schools.

The mission of the School Resource Officer (SRO) unit is to ensure a safe learning environment for students, teachers, and school administrators. This is accomplished by serving as a resource for students, parents, and faculty; by informally counseling students and serving as a mentor; by serving as a positive role model for students; and by enforcing laws on and around school campuses. The SRO works to prevent and solve problems within our schools and foster positive relationships between our community's youth and law enforcement. Currently six sworn police officers (one assigned at each high school) and one sergeant are assigned to the unit.

The Fremont Police Department, Animal Services Unit manages the Tri-City Animal Shelter. Staff is responsible for protecting lost and injured animals as well as protecting the public from animalcarried diseases.

## **Mobile Evaluation Team**

The Mobile Evaluation Team (MET) was created in 2016. The program partners a uniformed police officer with a mental health clinician from the Human Services Department and one from Washington Hospital. The overarching goals of MET is to provide a more comprehensive response to calls for service involving the homeless, and/or community members going through a mental health crisis.

MET is also a resource for community members struggling with homelessness, mental illness, as well as their care givers and loved ones. Currently one sworn Fremont police officer, one police sergeant, and two licensed clinicians are assigned to the unit.

The Community Engagement and Public Affairs Unit seeks to effectively engage the community and media to strengthen and foster enhanced trust, communication, transparency and mutual respect. Our mission is to help foster and maintain stronger relationships between the Police Department and the community it serves, while leveraging best practices and digital media technologies. Through strategic programs, education, and the dissemination of public information, members of the Community Engagement/Public Affairs team works to engage with residents, businesses, youth, community organizations and the media, in partnership with the Police, to network, raise crime prevention awareness, build relationships and improve quality of life in Fremont.
